- Forfeiture of continued financial assistance
- Homelessness
- Criminal involvement and incarceration
- Mental and physical health
- Inability to access education
- Reliance on public assistance

- Timing of Motion or Petition
- Who can file Motion or Petition
- Duties and Authority of the Child Welfare Agency
- Standard of Evidence for Reinstatement
- Required Court Findings and Duties/Authorities of Court

Other Individual Efforts



- Adoption petition
- Custody/Guardianship petition
- Presumed parent
- Writ of habeas corpus
- Modifying or vacating termination order
- Parens patriae authority of the court

Where do we go from here?




- Policy considerations
