

Key Elements of Engaging Fathers





Walking In The Door

Provide all fathers with children in imminent risk of entering foster care with the information they need to successfully advocate for Themselves and for their children.

Substance Abuse

To provide all fathers with substance abuse histories the skills they need to advocate for the services and resources they need to overcome their addiction and maintain their recovery.



Child and Family Team Meeting

Provide fathers with children in imminent risk of entering foster care the means to participate in all decisions made about their children's care, custody, and placement.

Policy and Resource Allocation

Provide fathers who have experienced the child welfare system with opportunities to influence and improve child welfare

policy, practice, and resource allocation



New Tools for Workers

Provide all child welfare staff the skills and tools necessary to work effectively with fathers and

children/youth.



Public Information

Inform the public, legislators, and the community at large about the struggles and

successes of fathers who

have been involved with child welfare
